

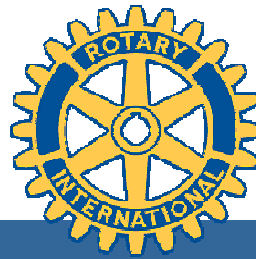
Being a Rotarian is hard work!

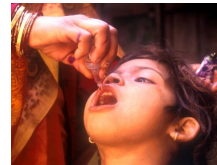

Rotary world-wide

Some facts about Rotary International:

- ❖ There are 1.2 million Rotarians in more than 200 countries, numbering 33,000 clubs.
- ❖ Rotary observed its 100th anniversary in 2005.
- ❖ Rotary International launched a \$120 million campaign in 1985 to eradicate polio in the world. \$380 million was raised in 20 years—and the number of cases went from 350,000 to less than 100 today!



Rotary in Jefferson City

- ❖ There are some 300 Rotarians in Jefferson City, many long-time leaders in the community. Rotary has been a part of the Capital City since 1918.
- ❖ One of Rotary's best-known projects is Rotary Centennial Park, located at the foot of the city's first river bridge on Bolivar Street. Rotarians in partnership with the city parks department maintain the nearby grounds, park benches and picnic tables that overlook the Missouri River just west of the State Capitol building.
- ❖ Another highly-visible project is the annual Mayor's Christmas Tree Lighting Program, held at the Rotary Centennial Park in which all four Jefferson City Rotary clubs plus Rotaract participate.



Our four primary Rotary clubs in Jefferson City plus Rotaract (the under-30 crowd) meet for breakfast (yep, the Breakfast Club on Wednesdays), for lunch at noon (Jefferson City Downtown Club on Mondays, the West Club on Fridays), and in the evening (you got it, the Evening Club on Tuesdays and Rotaract on the second and fourth Thursdays).

Recognizing the need to get more business and professional people involved in Rotary, all five Rotary clubs in Jefferson City are joining hands to recruit potential Rotarians to help get involved in local community good will projects and world-wide efforts to tackle such issues as education, health and world peace.

Why be a Rotarian?

Through its power in numbers, and its powerful "Four Way Test" motto for ethical behavior, Rotary has established itself around the world for its unselfish service to do wonders for mankind—from eradicating polio to responding to humanitarian needs throughout the world—be it Malawi, Tanzania or in our own back yard. Plus: Fellowship, fun, and getting to know people in your community!

Yes, there are commitments—from making 60 percent of meetings, to getting involved to help build goodwill and peace in the world.

That is service above self!

Education and youth are big benefactors of Rotary in Jefferson City. The West Club, for example, awards a \$1,000 per-year college scholarship (up to four years) along with a \$500 one-year Lincoln University scholarship. The Breakfast, Downtown and West clubs also honor high school seniors as Students of the Month.

Health and water are also big Rotary goals on the international front. Both the Breakfast and Evening clubs co-sponsor the building of a water distribution system in Malawi to provide safe drinking water to some 15,000 village people.
